## West Wittering Neighbourhood Plan 2019-2029

## Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) Opinion Screening Determination under Regulation 9 and Schedule 1 of the Environmental Assessment of Plans and Programmes Regulations 2004

This letter addresses the issue of whether or not there is a need for environmental assessment of the submission version of the West Wittering Neighbourhood Plan 2019-2029, and as such whether it meets one of the basic conditions that a neighbourhood plan must meet in order to proceed to referendum: that it does not breach, and is otherwise compatible with, EU obligations that are translated into current UK law by the above regulations.

On the basis of the contents of the neighbourhood plan as proposed and consultation with the relevant statutory agencies in accordance with Regulation 9(2) of the Environmental Assessment of Plans and Programmes Regulations 2004, the following determination can be made.

The screening determination is that an environmental assessment of the West Wittering Neighbourhood Plan is required due to there being, without mitigation measures, a likely significant environmental effect as a result of the proposals in the plan, acting in-combination with other plans and programmes.

A Strategic scheme of mitigation is in place for recreational disturbance impacts on Chichester and Langstone Harbours SPA/Ramsar site. Following a recent CJEU case ruling these mitigation schemes can only be taken into account at the Appropriate Assessment stage of the Habitats Regulations Assessment procedure (HRA). The need for an Appropriate Assessment in turn leads the screening determination given above in accordance with Regulation 5(3) of the Environmental Assessment of Plans and Programmes Regulations 2004. Consequently, and as the Parish has completed supporting SEA work for the neighbourhood plan, a precautionary approach is taken.

As such it is the opinion of Chichester District Council that the West Wittering Neighbourhood Plan 2019-2029 will need to have a formal Strategic Environmental Assessment for it to be in accordance with the provisions of the European Directive 2001/42/EC as incorporated into UK law by the Environmental Assessment of Plans and Programmes Regulations 2004.

This decision has been based on the information provided. If the contents of the Plan are revised and/or there is a material change in the environmental characteristics in the locality (e.g. any additional nature conservation or other environmental designations), then the

comments contained in this decision would need to be reconsidered in order to take account of the changes.

Natural England – reply – 6 July 2022	Screening Request: Strategic Environmental Assessment It is our advice, on the basis of the material supplied with the consultation, that, in so far as our strategic environmental interests (including but not limited to statutory designated sites, landscapes and protected species, geology and soils) are concerned, that there are unlikely to be significant environmental effects from the proposed plan. Neighbourhood Plan Guidance on the assessment of Neighbourhood Plans, in light of the Environmental Assessment of Plans and Programmes	
	Regulations 2004 (as amended), is contained within the National Planning Practice Guidance. The guidance highlights three triggers that may require the production of an SEA,	

for instance where: •a neighbourhood plan allocates sites for development •the neighbourhood area contains sensitive natural or heritage assets that may be affected by the proposals in the plan •the neighbourhood plan may have significant environmental effects that have not already been considered and dealt with through a sustainability appraisal of the Local Plan.
We have checked our records and based on the information provided, we can confirm that in our view the proposals contained within the plan will not have significant effects on sensitive sites that Natural England has a statutory duty to protect.
We are not aware of significant populations of protected species which are likely to be affected by the policies / proposals within the plan. It remains the case, however, that the responsible authority should provide information supporting this screening decision, sufficient to assess whether protected species are likely to be affected.
Notwithstanding this advice, Natural England does not routinely maintain locally specific data on all potential environmental assets. As a result the responsible authority should raise environmental issues that we have not identified on local or national biodiversity action plan species and/or habitats, local wildlife sites or local landscape character, with its own ecological and/or landscape advisers, local record centre, recording society or wildlife body on the local landscape and biodiversity receptors that may be affected by this plan, before determining whether an SA/SEA is necessary.
Please note that Natural England reserves the right to provide further comments on the environmental assessment of the plan beyond this SEA/SA screening stage, should the responsible authority seek our views on the scoping or environmental report stages. This includes any third party appeal against any screening decision you may make.
