t is only in adversity that character is tested, and this season the players of our rugby club displayed resolution beyond measure. Motivated by a sense of grievance at the manner of our relegation from the league above, we set out with the twin aims of both winning all our matches, and gaining promotion. The former remains a target; the latter was accomplished in some style.

We run this team off a tiny player base; we hardly ever get a full team out training, but this club has produced a complete, balanced, passionate team that was successful this season, and can be successful for several seasons to come. As I told the players before one of our final matches this season it was an bonour



one of our final matches this season, it was an honour just to be in the team, let alone to lead it.

We have worked hard recently during the off season to stimulate interest in the club from recent school leavers, and this has paid off with Sean Goh, Barry Murphy, and Micheal James making significant contributions all season. They have also provided that essential balance of youth and experience that any great team must have, with the sensible younger players reining-in the wild aspirations of some of the older guys like David Kelly and Mark Freer.

A strong start saw us win the first four games, but our dream of an unbeaten season was taken from us by Sarries amateurs. They were a strong team, but we felt we had the measure of them in several areas, and would have beaten them, had a nightclub in Clapham not deprived us of two key players. This unfortunate loss was followed by an outright catastrophe; in driving rain, on a hunchbacked pitch, and administered by one of the most woefully incompetent men I have ever encountered, we lost to Hendon. This loss in particular put our chances of promotion in jeopardy.

To cheer us up, the next game was against league leaders, and promotion rivals Old Streetonians. It was here that our revival started; although we lost the game, we found ourselves. The team was starting to mould itself into a versatile, pugnacious outfit, where players slotted in where they were needed and played for each other. **cont. page 14**

Nobis et Scholae

The first half of our bicentenary year has been marked by a sequence of celebratory events. In January the Head of Drama, David Proudlock, directed three performances of his historical and social pageant "Never Had It So Good" at a crowded Arts Depot Theatre in Finchley and guests were also able to view some excellent exhibits of work created by the School's artists. This was closely followed by our musicians led by Director of Music, Richard Allain, in two "Unplugged" concerts. The Service of Thanksgiving at St Paul's Cathedral on 1 March will remain strongly etched on the memories of all 2400 past and present pupils and parents who attended. The sun shone brightly, the immaculate CCF guard of honour lined the steps for the arrival of the Lord Mayor of the City of London and the Choir sang superbly. The Rt Revd John Perry (OM) gave a fine sermon linking past traditions, present achievements and future challenges; the Chairman of the Life Governors, Bill Skinner (OM), received from the Lancaster Herald a new coat of arms for the School and Foundation. Afterwards there were receptions at Stationers Hall and St Bride's where it was a pleasure to welcome many Old Millhillian guests.

The sun also shone on 2 May when the School was honoured to receive HRH The Countess of Wessex. After spending time with pupils and teachers from Grimsdell and Belmont, the Countess graciously opened the Favell Building before a crowd of some 1500 well-wishers, made a short speech wishing the School well in its next two hundred years and was presented to the Monitors and other pupils. The CCF Corps of Drums gave the Countess a fine display on Top Terrace. Many Old Millhillians were present, including a reunion of those who witnessed the visit of HM The Queen in 1957. The Favell Building stands as symbolic testimony of our debt to our Founders and our confidence in our ability to offer excellence in education in the future. It has received much approbation: its stylish lines sensitively complement the other major buildings on the Quad. Inside, a stunning blend of light and space is revealed, offering a traditional format with state-of-the-art teaching facilities. We hope it will stand the test of time and become Mill Hill's iconic building of the 21st century.

Sport has also been much in evidence. There was an international mixed hockey match at Southgate Hockey Club in March, our golfers won the London competition of the HMC tournament and now go on to compete with seven other schools in the national final in July, our cricketers have had a promising season although rain sadly prevented play in the bicentennial Captains Match, and, finally, our rugby squad leaves shortly for its tour of New Zealand and the Cook Islands.

It gives me great pleasure to be able to hand over the School for the second half of its bicentennial celebrations to my successor Dr Dominic Luckett. I am sure Old Millhillians will quickly come to appreciate his many qualities and will welcome him and his wife Cara to our community. For our part, Margaret and I leave Mill Hill with many happy memories. The School has played a huge part in our lives. It was an immense privilege to be invited to become Headmaster and to receive the fulsome support of the wider Mill Hill community including most importantly the members of the Old Millhillians Club. I thank you sincerely for your warm fellowship throughout all the years and very much hope to remain in close touch with you all in the future.

Bicentennial Appeal

Old Millhillians have responded positively to the announcement of the Bicentennial Appeal. The twin objectives of the Appeal – people and places – have been well-received. In particular the creation of bursaries to offer opportunities to talented local pupils has really struck a chord with Old Millhillians who remember the "Middlesex" Scheme" or its successor the "assisted places scheme". There have been some moving testimonies by "Middlesex Boys" to the opportunity which Mill Hill gave them..

The Governors' intention to embark on fundraising was formally announced on 1st March: its objective is to establish ongoing sources of funding, not to raise a specific sum for a specific project in a defined period. The initial phase, under the name of The Bicentennial Appeal, has, after just four months, received pledges in excess of 25% of the initial target of £3m. These range from Leadership Gifts through Top Terracers to Supporters. People have made significant one-off gifts while others have committed to monthly direct debits ranging from £10 to £100 or annual direct debits of over £1000; others are considering giving shares or leaving la legacy. Gifts of all sizes and types are valuable. Current President Geoffrey Vero and next President Ronny Cohn clearly stated their commitment and that of the Club to the future of the School through the Appeal. It is hoped that many more Old Millhillians will follow the lead of those who have already pledged.

GOLFING SOCIETY Halford Hewitt Report April 2007

The OMGS is mostly known for great social golf played off handicap on top courses.We do also have twenty players off single figure handicaps and for these better OMGS golfers the main aim is to be competitive in the Halford Hewitt competition at Royal Cinque Ports and Royal St. Georges.

The Halford Hewitt has been described by the golf writer Nick Tremayne as 'the greatest of all truly amateur tournaments'. Founded in 1924, it's a knock-out scratch competition contested by the old boys of 64 English and Scottish public schools each fielding five foursomes pairs, making 640 competitors in all. The sheer size of the field plus the hundreds of supporters is part of what makes the Hewitt a unique sporting event. The tournament has a rich history, frequently pits average golfers against famous internationals, and produces moments of golfing pressure simply not experienced by amateur players elsewhere.

We fielded a reasonable team with an average handicap of 6.5, although we all know, 'golf's not played on paper' and handicaps are no measure of ability when you're under pressure in the wind at Deal.

BURMA (Myanmar)



to visit or not to visit?

Having recently returned from a family visit to Yangon. I recalled the comments made during the St.Paul's memorial sermon on 1st March regarding the human rights record of Myanmar. This prompted me to write an article for Martlet.

had previously visited Myanmar 9 years ago; it is still controlled by a repressive, mendacious and somewhat whimsical military junta; there is no political freedom and Aung San Suu Kyi ('Our Lady'), the country's well-known dissident, is undergoing her 3rd spell of house arrest. However, there have also been modest improvements which may not be evident to the package tourist or foreign commentator.

In 1997, myself and my daughter Natalie, travelled without a family chaperone to Central Burma and the Shan States, but there were many prohibited areas. Whilst these are fewer in number now, the persecution of ethnic minorities, particularly the Karens, continues. The fact that Karens are mostly Christians is an obvious focus for ecclesiastical interest by the UK. So to visit or not?

Those agin claim that tourists are funding a brutal regime and whilst 'Our Lady' would have no objection to a trip by No 2 daughter Carole, (my medical minder) and myself, she frowns on expensive package tours, whose

clientele kick-off at the Strand Hotel where rooms retail at \$450 a night !! Thant Myint-U*, the grandson of U Thant, whom you might recall was one of the United Nations early and most unaligned Secretary Generals, is for responsible tourism. In his view isolation has been Burma's curse and is the regime's default condition. Tourist money does not prop up the Government – nearly all hotels are privately or foreign owned. The Government receives airport taxes and other small tourist fees, but this is negligible compared with the billions of \$ derived from Natural Gas exports as well as the aid received from China.

I believe such tourism can help lift many ordinary people out of poverty and an influx of outsiders will hasten the possibility of political change. So we based ourselves in Yangon, a city of 4.5 million souls which gives the impression of picturesque dishevelment, a half-finished work in progress and is the most interesting, cosmopolitan city in Burma. As it was very hot (40 degrees), we were appreciative of our small, inexpensive hotel (\$25 per air-conditioned room per night), located in north Yangon near the core of our family. We made an arduous pilgrimage to the mountain with the Golden Pagoda on the Balancing Boulder at Kyaiktiyo, with three of our young cousins. It was a two day trip by car, lorry and foot – except Aye Maung, as befits his station was carried up and down the last 5 miles (unbelievably steep) in a dhoolie (Burmese sedan chair (SEE PIC)

For a week we explored Greater Yangon by foot, cab and rail - the city is a sightseers/photographers paradise, from the 50 metre reclining Buddha to the incomparable Shwedagon paya topped by tons of gold leaf. The not particularly comfortable 3 hour circular train ride around Yangon is a must (\$1 ea). But what has changed for the citizens? For my age group - who tend to refer to the colonial days as a Golden Age – very little. But for the young there is the Internet, mobile phones, supermarkets packed with Chinese products, cinemas showing relatively recent foreign films, their own hip-hop stars etc etc. Their role model is a Western one, but this appears to be tolerated by the regime.

I departed with much more hope for Myanmar's future, than after my last visit.

Sponsored Swim



Whilst on a ferry crossing to France, aged 10, it was confirmed to me that it was possible to swim The Channel and since then it has been one of my life-long ambitions.

fter two near-death experiences in open water, where my abilities to remain calm and focused were pushed to the limit, I decided that I would pursue completing what is regarded as the World's ultimate swimming challenge. With a 90% failure rate due to the extreme cold water conditions and being the busiest shipping channel in the World, it was necessary to become physically and mentally prepared.

I decided that my first attempt to swim The Channel would be as part of a relay team, so I approached friends that I knew would be dedicated to training and fund-raising. Twelve months later we were at the peak of our fitness, had perfected our swimming technique and set out to France on 4th September 2006 at 8.17 am.

The twelve months training schedule was rigorous and we were swimming in cold open water in Dover, partaking in every swimming competition we could find and many days began at 5am swimming in Hampstead Lido in order to acclimatise to the cold conditions we would endure on the actual day. Despite this, there were a lot of good memories from the training, including swimming under the stars whilst it snowed at the Oasis Centre causing one of my team to swim into me and give me a black eye. In July, I competed in the UK's longest offshore swim in Bournemouth and realised I needed to concentrate on mentally preparing myself. The David Walliams documentary was screened the following week and combined with discussions with the team and friends it helped me to go through the motions of how I would deal with every eventuality: the hyperventilating always followed by swallowing sea water; hypothermia; swimming in murky waters where you cant see a thing you are swimming through (including the jelly fish and sewage below); the fact that last year they lost someone on a swim (he was finally washed ashore, 3 days later); 5 metre waves; Basking sharks; the loneliness of swimming for long periods of time with just your thoughts; seasickness; the list is endless. The only fear I was unable to overcome was the fact that, unlike a marathon where if you struggle someone can easily get to you, in open water, if you find yourself in trouble it is a matter of life or death! Knowing that the Pilot and Observer are close at hand on the day comforted me slightly but it really was denial that would get me through it. Another motivation was that this crazy idea of mine was for a good cause and we finally raised £14,000 for our chosen charities Hopes and Homes and Cancer Research UK.

The administration behind a Channel Swim attempt is immense as safety is paramount. We decided that we would go with the less stringent rules of The Channel Crossing Association as they are allowed to assist you if you fall into trouble as opposed to stopping and voiding the swim.

Our designated swim week upon 'The SeaKing' was between 30th August and 6th September 2006. The Pilot is contacted daily to give you a vague idea of when your swim is and then he confirms at 7.30 pm if your swim is going ahead the next day. This meant that we had to be packed and ready to go at any moment. The first swim of the week went ahead and was completed in 9 hours, the second swim team dropped out so we were next in line. Gale force winds put us on hold for a whole weekend where the team were constantly on tenterhooks with nothing to do really apart from carb-load and sleep! With the help of a team member's grandfather, who had become a sea forecast expert over the course of the week, we decided that we should be in Dover on 3rd September. This proved to be a wise move. We sat anxiously in an Italian restaurant in Folkestone waiting for the 7.30 pm call, which arrived at 9 pm as the Pilot had gone to the pub and forgotten his mobile phone at home! At that point he still could not confirm as the wind had yet to drop, so we were to call him at 6.30 am and if confirmed, then we needed to be ready to swim within the hour. We were relieved that we might finally be swimming, but more so because the sun would have risen at 7.30 am which meant no swimming in the dark. He confirmed and we rushed down to the harbour. The first member greased up, jumped overboard, swam towards the White Cliffs of Dover, the time was noted and he began the journey to France. We were all very excited and began discussing how we would then start training for solo swims, then the Observer commented that she gave us 30 minutes before our enthusiasm died, as that is how long it takes for the sea sickness to set in. Needless to say, she was right! Our first

swimmer struggled to get out of the shoreline due to wave rebound but managed to clear quite a distance. The next swimmer swam for an hour, followed by myself. I managed to cope very well with the cold and managed to find my rhythm very easily. I also kept trying to out-swim the boat in order to maintain my pace. As soon as I saw the fourth swimmer greasing up I knew it was almost my time to swap and was relieved. The next swimmer started off immaculately but then succumbed to seasickness as the water was choppy and started to suffer from hypothermia so he was pulled out immediately and attended to with life blankets and body bags where he joined the other team members, horrendously sea-sick. We then entered the shipping lane and in jumped the remaining female swimmers who performed excellently given the swell, currents and ferries in abundance. One trawler and a cargo ship did not pick up their radios and went from being on the horizon one minute, to looming beside us the next. This meant pulling out two of our swimmers. We then needed to make an executive decision about whether we were going to allow our Pilot to motor us through part of the shipping lane, as the weather had taken a turn for the worse and we were now unexpectedly two men down. Everyone agreed and on leaving the busiest part of the shipping lane we all started jumping in again in turn. After gaining confidence in my first stretch I struggled on my second and every time I swum a stroke my mind was on the boat which was being violently thrown around and I was expecting it to crash down on me any moment. I was then hit by a strong wave and was unable to obtain a rhythm so whilst giving myself a pep talk I was being screamed at by the Pilot to keep moving as the small boat attached at the back would otherwise swing round into me. The cold and panic started to set in and I asked to be taken out for a few minutes to recover whilst someone else swam. Our strongest swimmer nicknamed 'The Fish' was only too happy to oblige. By the time I had recovered, the team had undemocratically taken a vote without me, that as team captain I should be the one to swim to France. I conceded. As I started the final leg I could hear the cheers behind me and I swam smoothly all the way to our goal, melted with happiness when my feet touched the sandy shores, danced on the beach whilst waving like a lunatic at French onlookers before running back into the sea and back to the boat. When I got back I was told that a seal had swum with me up to the shore but they thought it best that I was oblivious to this fact in case I freaked out. That was a wise move.

The journey to France had taken us 9 hours 59 minutes and back to the safety of English shores, three hours. The return journey was against the tide and if the saying, 'Calm seas do not great sailors make' is true, then I am a professional. We were battered by waves, numbed by the cold and sodden with seawater. I still couldn't walk in a straight line the next day!

Would I attempt a solo swim now? Ask me again in a year's time when I can finally look back on the whole day through rose tinted spectacles. For the moment though, I am a Eurostar Girl! Thank you very much to The Old Millhillians Club for their kind donation and to all the Old Millhillians who sponsored our swim.

Alford House

To the great relief for all concerned with the club, the planning application for the much talked about redevelopment of Alford House has finally been seen through to a successful conclusion.



Following the intervention of the local MP, Kate Hoey, and the assistance of a local councillor, planning permission was eventually granted in April this year at a meeting of the Delegated Panel of Lambeth Council, several months later than anticipated. This is a great achievement for all those who have been involved in the process and means that the process of seeking funding can now begin in earnest. A Redevelopment Sub-Committee has already met and identified that the key to the success of the project is a professional project manager.

The next stage is approach a number of potential candidates with the business plan and invite them to tender so that we can get an accurate view of the total overall cost. At the moment we believe that the budget will be approximately £4 million, but this is, inevitably at this stage, a rough figure. Following this process we will need to start identifying possible sources of fund raising and we hope that we will be to get funding in order to pay for a fund raiser. This is another crucial area since the success of the project will depend on this. However, in reality we would have to carry out major repairs to the club in the relatively near future, just to maintain it in good condition, and this would probably cost about £1 million in any event.

The good news is that Lambeth Council are being supportive of the project. Club Manager Tim Saunders has met with the Lambeth Local Strategic Partnerships Manager and he has undertaken to bring senior Lambeth Managers, including the Chief Executive, and local partners to a workshop at Alford House. Another piece of good news is that Alford House has just been chosen to be the Community Access Point for the Connexions Service. This means the club will house two full time personal advisors for young people and also a part-time careers advisor. This is a great resource for the club members and also raises our profile in the local area. It will build up daytime activity in Alford House and also bring in revenue for hosting the Connexions Service.

Numbers attending the club remain consistent and overall the figures are quite good despite the concerns about gangrelated violence and feuding in the borough. Lots of good work is continuing in the club and to name just two, Dulwich Picture Gallery is continuing its outreach art work at the club and the relationship, which has developed over a number of years is going from strength to strength; in addition the 'Endz to da Hood' initiative is an exciting project which will hopefully take a number of Alford House members to a youth club in Brooklyn, New York, founded in the same year as the club, 1884. The aim is to compare the lives and experiences of young people in the "Endz" of London with "Hood" of New York and those involved are currently training and preparing DVDs of their backgrounds, history and daily lives.

I hope that this brief update provides an idea of the current situation at Alford House and the opportunities that it can give to the young people of North Lambeth. As always I would like to thank the Club Manager, Tim Saunders, Senior Youth Worker Jo Dempster and all their staff for their continuing efforts and also the Governors, Executive Committee and the Old Millhillians Club for their support.

We had several selection issues, in particular at halfback, where, after several failed experiments the Simon Bunyard/ Mary Freer partnership began to pick itself.

That was the first half of the season, and after three losses on the trot, it may have seemed at that point, that our chances of fulfilling our aim of promotion was in tatters. Those defeats meant that, from Christmas onward, only victory in every remaining league match would give us the slimmest of chances of promotion. The players refused to let go of that dream. We went out and smashed Hendon, we went nose to nose with Sarries amateurs and gave them nothing. We played away matches in some pretty crummy places; a council ground covered in rabbit holes in Tottenham, a place in Watford where a shipping container served as the changing room. We played a game against Old Habs which we were losing 14-0 with 15 minutes remaining, and scored three tries to win. We worked hard, believed in ourselves, and played for each other. We won them all.

On April 14, before the last league game, the top of the table was crowded; Sarries had overtaken Old Streetonians at the top, and had secured guaranteed promotion. We were behind Streetonians. The winner of our match would be second in the league, earning the right to a play off against the second placed team in a parallel league, for promotion. It was an all or nothing game, this was a chance that we had earned, and as group we chose to take it. I think we spent the last twenty minutes defending our line, I believe they crossed our line several times, but were driven back. It was an intense, attritional game on a very hot day, and we did not stop working. It was a great win, but carried the potential to be rendered meaningless in the very next game.

After seven months of rugby, the value of the entire season had become distilled in to this single game, eighty minutes that would determine our fate. Guys had joined the club that year, Ben Jones and Tyrone Macdonald from New Zealand, Scotty Mortimer, after a lengthy absence still super fit and hard as nails, Richard Dweck, always giving it his best shot. Other had been with us for only a short while, such as Dan Aukland, a player with a ton of potential, Ruairi Higgins, like a bloody metronome with that throw of his. James and Paul Mason, both guys who will go the extra mile for the club, and for the team. Keiron Walsh, James Carson and Sean Goh, forming the heart of the pack. The best centre pairing in the business, Jamie Adler and David Kelly who built brick walls all over London this season. Player/coach Sean Hardy, Joe Croft, Will Gallagher, Mike James, Jonny Tucker, Jon Lawn, Mike Seabroke, Barry Murphy. These guys stood up and decided that we were not going to lose that game. The worth of this club is in the people that are willing to put on the jersey and the boots. So long as we have them, we can achieve anything.
