Nobis et Scholae

The past weeks have been extremely busy ones at the School. On 29 September, we formally concluded the bicentennial celebrations with a combined Foundation Day and Old Millhillians' day. Our guest of honour at prizegiving was Alderman Sir Gavyn Arthur, a former Lord Mayor of London, and we were also delighted to welcome a large number of Old Millhillians back to the School. During the course of the day, various sporting events took place and academic departments put on a range of displays and demonstrations in the classrooms and laboratories. There was also a well-attended Scrutton House reunion. Following a display by the superb CCF Corps of Drums, a film was projected on a giant screen hung on the School House portico, showing the life of the School over the past year. The day then concluded with fireworks. It was a spectacular and fitting way to conclude the bicentennial year, and a very great pleasure to see so

many of our former pupils coming back to Mill Hill.

In other respects, the term has provided me with many successes to report. Our sports teams are doing exceptionally well. The 1st XV, following a highly successful tour of New Zealand in the summer, have won all but one of their matches and, following a hard-fought contest against Latymer Upper School at the Old Millhillians' ground at Headstone Lane, have now been crowned Middlesex County Champions. Many of the Schools' other rugby teams have also had very successful seasons, notably the Colts A, who remain unbeaten. Not to be outdone, the girls 1st XI hockey team are also undefeated and, after winning their County Championship, went on to be placed fourth in the Nationals. Sport at Mill Hill has seldom been stronger.

Music and drama continue to flourish. The choir were in wonderful voice at the Service of

Remembrance on 10 November, and at a superb School concert the following week. The House Drama Festival has also taken place this term with Atkinson, Burton Bank, Collinson and Ridgeway being the final contenders. Ridgeway House emerged triumphant having last won the trophy back in 1992.

Among the most important of the term's events was the visit by a team of inspectors from the Schools' Independent Such inspections Inspectorate. take place every six years, and provide us with an opportunity to receive a critical, impartial and objective assessment of how well we are doing. The verdict of the inspectors was overwhelmingly positive. They commented particularly favourably upon our high standards of pastoral care, our boarding provision, the breadth and range of our extra-curricular activities and the decency and warmth of our pupils. inspectors did say that, whilst our overall academic performance is good, some aspects of our teaching, assessment and reporting could be further developed, and this will be a major focus of the coming terms. Overall, though, they were predictably impressed by what we do.

It is a great privilege for me to be part of this great School, and to succeeded such have outstanding Headmaster as William Winfield. I certainly have a tough act to follow. William's achievements are too numerous to mention, but the new Favell building stands as a testament to his vision, his energy and his success in putting Mill Hill on a secure financial footing. We now have wonderful foundations upon which to build as we look forward to our third century. There will, I am sure, be many challenges However, with the ahead. continuing support of the Old Millhillians, I am sure we can succeed in making a great school greater still. My wife, Cara, and I have very much enjoyed meeting many members of the Old Millhillians' Club over the past months, and we look forward to meeting many more in the years to come.


Chit Chat




Old Millhillians Day

Shanghai

One of the first Chinese phrases I learnt during my stay in Shanghai last year was, 'Ni hen gao!', or 'You are very tall!'

I had arrived in the jewel of China's booming capitalist crown for a six week Mandarin language course with EF Education.

Along with my fellow students, including a Japanese monk, a Latvian lawyer and a Danish backpacker, I attended classes every weekday morning and some afternoons at the EF school in the centre of town, a short metro ride away from the flat I shared with several others.

Despite the fact that none of us had studied any Chinese before, thereby placing us firmly in the beginners' class, we all made optimistic progress, partly due to the small classes and good tuition, but also simply because living in the city and hearing Chinese being spoken everywhere enabled us to pick up vocabulary and phrases.

Shanghai is an incredibly energetic city on the up and is arguably the best place to see the China of the future.

During my stay, I discovered that Mandarin is an interesting challenge for Westerners because of two features of the language: firstly the complex writing system, and secondly the fact that it is a tonal language, meaning that saying the same word at different pitches completely alters its meaning.

Nonetheless, by the end of my course I had learnt enough Chinese to survive backpacking round the rest of the country with a friend, and to impress locals on sleeper trains, although the local Shanghaihua dialect remains incomprehensible to me!

Alford House

Having received the good news, as reported in the last Martlet, that we have now obtained planning permission for the redevelopment of the Alford House club premises, the next hurdle to overcome is the raising of the £3.5 to 4 million

that the programme will cost.

We are taking a measured approach to this process and ensuring that we are not spending money on the project that we have not managed to raise. (The whole planning application process was funded by obtaining grants and did not cost the club any of its capital.) I am pleased to report that we have now received a grant to enable a study of the feasibility of raising such large sums to be undertaken. We have put out to tender to a number of fund raising companies and have had a number of positive responses.

In addition to this process, and with the ultimate aim being the redevelopment process, the club is being changed from trust to a company limited by guarantee.

This is essential in terms of the liability of the trustees, (directors), when, in the future we hope to be in a position to sign building contracts and so on.

Alford House also finds itself in a new position with Lambeth. The old grant, which had not increased for several years, has now gone and we find ourselves in the new regime of tendering for contracts to Lambeth to

run youth work provision. Hopefully, this will bring in more revenue than the old grant and the contracts would run for three years, nonetheless, there would be some potential risk, which the move to limited company status would alleviate.

We have also been fortunate to receive funding from the Jack Petchey Foundation and at a ceremony on 24th October, the local area grants officer for this fund presented a cheque for £20,000 to the club, which was accepted on our behalf by Kate Hoey MP. This money will fund the

post of senior youth worker in to the new financial year.

Mention should also be made of a generous legacy of £5,000, left to the club in the will of the late T.D. (Dick) Walker, a distinguished Old Millhillian, who had been involved with the club since his days at Mill Hill in the 1930s and was for

many years Chairman Governors of Alford House.

Finally I should record the gratitude of the club to Mr Paul Bickerdike, on his retirement from the teaching staff

He has been the link between the club and the school for many years and, happily, is continuing his involvement with Alford House in his retirement.

We are delighted to welcome Mrs Jane Sanchez, Deputy Head of Mill Hill, to the Governors and Executive Committee in order to maintain the liaison.

As always I would like to thank the Club Manager, Tim Saunders, Senior Youth Worker Jo Dempster and all their staff for their continuing efforts and also the Governors. Executive Committee and the Old Millhillians Club for their support.


