The summer term is always a feverishly busy one as pupils and teachers focus upon the impending challenge of public examinations. With those trials now over we can but wait until the publication of results in August. Given how

hard they have been working, however, I have no doubt that our Fifth and Sixth Formers will once again secure some outstanding grades.

Aside from the formal, timetabled curriculum, the past months have seen a large number of pupils engage in debates, workshops and challenge lectures in order to explore fresh ideas and to see academic topics in a fresh, and often interdisciplinary, way. Among the most popular of this year's lunchtime debates was the mock election, the outcome of which predicted the 7 May result far more accurately than the professional opinion pollsters. Another recent highlight was the commemoration of the 90th anniversary of Cecil Goyder's historic two-way radio communication between Britain and New Zealand in 1924. Our celebrations included a re-enactment of that broadcast from the Science School which was featured live on Radio 4's Today programme.

Recent artistic highlights have included a hugely entertaining production of Cabaret and an exceptionally good set of performances in the Farrow Singing Competition. Meanwhile, we have seen many individual and team successes in sport. Five pupils have been nationally recognised this year: Will Kaye, Burton Bank, for rugby; Kimberley Balcombe, McClure, for biathlon; golfer Priya Pankhania, Priestley; swimmer Natasha Philiastides, Cedars; and cricketer Sophia Dunkley, Cedars. Many others gained regional or county honours in golf, rugby, tennis and cricket. Perhaps most notable were our achievements in hockey with eight boys and girls gaining county recognition with the Middlesex under-17s.

The CCF has had another excellent year. Many cadets learned to powerboat, sail and fly and many more attended camps throughout the year. This year's Annual General Inspection and Newcastle Competition (won by Ridgeway) were particularly impressive and the Corps of Drums has continued to do us proud at events in School and further afield.

Charitable activity continues to be a major strand of School life, with pupils raising over £30,000 for projects at home and abroad, including our overseas partnerships, the Philippines Boat Project campaign, and the Nepal earthquake disaster fund.

Millhillians, as always, have travelled the world. Recent sporting tours include a very well-attended tennis trip to Portugal and an equally popular ski trip to Austria. Our linguists headed to Madrid, Granada and Rouen and there were visits to Berlin for historians; Iceland for geographers; Venice for artists; and Paris for budding European policy makers. Finally, Fourth Formers visited France and Belgium for the annual battlefields trip.

Many staff have been engaged in the preparations for the opening of our new school, The Mount, Mill Hill International, which will welcome its first pupils in September. We were also visited in March by a team from the Independent Schools Inspectorate who conducted our three-yearly boarding inspection and left after giving us a clean bill of health for all elements of our boarding provision.

As is always the case, a number of staff have left us to take up fresh professional challenges or to embark upon a well-deserved retirement. I would like to express particular thanks to Mr Philip Thonemann and Mr Mark Northen who retired after especially long and distinguished Mill Hill careers; and Mrs Maggie Atkins and Mr Nick Gregory (who leaves to take up his own headship) who have been a great support to me as members of the Senior Management Team. I would like to wish them, and all our leavers, every happiness and success for the future.

It is also important to pay tribute to Mrs Lynn Duncan who retired this summer after a decade at the helm of Belmont. During that time, she has achieved tremendous success and leaves the School in fine shape. I know that her successor, Mr Leon Roberts, formerly the Deputy Head of Belmont, is looking forward to building upon her many achievements.

Finally, I extend my sincere thanks to all those members of the Club who have helped make this an especially enjoyable and fulfilling year for me. The friendship and support which they have shown me has been very much appreciated.


Property Dinner

Dominic Luckett will be leaving Mill Hill at the end of the Autumn Term 2015. If I were to ask The Headmaster to tell me what his most significant reflections on his tenure are, I think that he might identify a series of achievements and advances made by The Foundation under his leadership.

Dominic Luckett succeeded a popular and energetically successful predecessor – William Winfield. Building onto foundations already in place and supported by an excellent team, the academic standards have improved, with the effect that Mill Hill is now more than ever a first choice destination - "a go-to school" - in a fiercely competitive market place.

Holding and increasing market share has had the effect of creating the confidence to invest in the future of The Foundation. Not just new and improved buildings but also a wider range of extracurricular activities and a growing reputation in such activities as music, in particular. One special highlight, very much the brainchild of The Headmaster, is the establishment of The Mount, Mill Hill International School. The merger of the two schools created opportunities to maintain an educational presence on The Mount site and also to enhance The Foundation's reputation and standing around the world. This is certain to bring benefits to the School community and to the OM Club, which already has strong ties worldwide.

As for the future, Dominic and his family will take up their new life in Sherborne at the start of 2016, knowing that what they have achieved at Mill Hill is greatly admired. The audition process was particularly fierce with fifty applicants competing for just two places and Ben will be undertaking this in September.

"Good evening, I am calling from Mill Hill School"

By the time you read this several hundred Old Millhillians will have had telephone conversations with members of our team of callers. Indeed you may be one of them. The calls triggered reminiscences, long-forgotten names and places and some interesting questions. Our callers, aged 17-24, had been briefed in School history and given some idea of what to expect.

However there were still a few surprises. Both the callers and the people they spoke to found the whole exercise enormously enjoyable and worthwhile. Of course, the telethon was a fundraising exercise but it was also a "friend-raising" one. The callers were seeking support for the A Better Chance campaign but they were also encouraging Old Millhillians to come back on 19th September or attend other OM events, to help with careers or contact old friends. More detail of the outcomes of the telethon will be in a future edition.

Fundraising has always had two distinct approaches – to that small number who can make major gifts and to the large number whose smaller gifts can collectively make a real difference. The telethon focus was on the latter. Six pupils are currently funded by the tremendous generosity of three Old Millhillians. Lord Glendonbrook, who has supported three bursary places so far,



has offered in principle to fund three more pupils from September 2016. Also from September 2016 there will be the inaugural Grinton Award, established as a tribute to and in memory of the parents of an Old Millhillian both of whom were teachers at some stage in their careers. The award is intended for a girl whose primary interest is art or whose talent is directed towards the humanities (e.g. History, English, languages).

The benefactor's generosity means there will be a succession of awards over many many years. The Foundation is enormously grateful for this generosity. Other pupils benefit from funding from Old Millhillians in North America, led by David A B Brown and Robin Mills, and by gifts at various levels from other Old Millhillians and parents and from the recent legacies of John Plant and Steve Farris.

I am looking forward to joining Russell Cowan at the events in Toronto and New York in the autumn, seeing Collinsonians and other Old Millhillians on 19th September and at other reunions and Club events.
